



Landscaping . . .

For everyone who owns a mature Thundercloud tree, check it to see if there are dead branches or "suckers" that need to be removed, or overhanging branches that might need to be pruned back. If so, please avoid having the people who mow your lawn being the ones who you hire to prune your tree!

There are a few Thundercloud trees in our neighborhood that have been terribly abused by well-meaning but ill-informed people.
Thundercloud trees should be trimmed by a professional arborist. Two local arborists you could contact include:

If you have a thundercloud sapling taped to a pole, please loosen the tape now so the tree can grow!

Since we are discussing landscaping, remember to care for your lawn. Please mow it, feed it, and remove weeds. Weed seeds travel. It is just common courtesy to prevent the spread of your weeds onto your neighbor's property. Also keep shrubs and trees that are growing near the sidewalks trimmed so there is a clear path for pedestrians to walk.

<u>Creating a safe community</u>...

Now more than ever: Trash cans need to be put back out of sight by the evening of trash collection day please. Apparently, thieves think that if trash cans are still sitting out after trash day, then possibly you are not at home! Here in the Vineyard, the incidence of crime is very low compared to other neighborhoods. Even so, we still need to be careful. Below are some other good ideas for keeping your property and your family safe....

- 1. Walk around the exterior of your home and scout out its weaknesses. The best way to protect your home from the outside is to survey it with the eyes of a burglar. If you can easily tell that a window could be pried open, a thief will definitely be able to come to the same conclusion. While you're checking for vulnerable spots, take note of any expensive electronics, art, or furniture that is easily spotted through windows.
- 2. Keep shrubbery around entrances and walkways trimmed. The last thing you want is to make it easier for a thief to hide when attempting to break in, so eliminate his options for hiding spots. You could even plant thorny shrubs by your windows to make it not only difficult to break in, but painful!
- 3. Stow expensive items like grills, cars, and bikes in the garage. Though it may seem like a hassle to roll out the grill for every barbecue, leaving it out makes it an easy target for thieves. They don't even have to enter your home to grab it, and if it's got wheels it can be a breeze to sneak away with.

- 4. Use curtains on garage and basement windows. These areas don't need the sunlight!
- 5. Please install motion sensor lighting and cameras around your home, especially at entrances. Shine a spotlight on a potential intruder before he can even touch your doors or windows by adding extra lighting with motion detectors at entrances and especially dark corners of your home. Lighting activated by the motion of a potential intruder is a more effective deterrent than dusk to dawn lighting. If you have a home security system, place the notice sign on your front lawn. You can also receive new replacement signs every year from your company for free.
- 6. Get to know your neighbors. Crime tends to be lower in tight-knit communities because neighbors are more likely to look out for one another and can easily spot a stranger. Your neighbors can be one of your best assets in home crime prevention because they offer extra eyes and an outside perspective. Plus if they have a different work schedule from yours, they might be around during the day when you're away and can alert you to any suspicious activity. The Vineyard is a neighborhood block watch community. Neighborhood Watch Committees receive regular email updates from the police concerning break-ins, security issues and other important news. - 7. Keep your yard free of toys, tools, and ladders. A yard littered with toys signals to a thief that the house may be filled with equally interesting entertainment inside. A ladder or toolbox left out even briefly for an afternoon can give an opportunistic thief help in gaining access to your home.
- 8. Contact Puget Sound Energy if you notice a street light burned out. Simply go onto the PSE website and fill out the form. (You will need to include the pole's serial number found on the side of every pole.)

- 9. Keep fences, gates, and garage doors locked. It's best to leave them locked at all times. Never leave your garage door open if you aren't in it or outside and able to keep an eye on it.
- **10.** Be sure your house number is visible from the street. This makes it easier for police to identify your home in the event of an emergency.
- 11. Secure your car. Vineyard homeowners are required to park two cars inside their garage....but if you must park in your driveway, bring valuables like cell phones, purses, GPS devices, and satellite radios inside. Never leave anything of value in plain view, and always lock the doors and roll up windows.
- 12. If you find yourself witnessing a crime, call 911 immediately and start recognizing, remembering, and documenting everything you are seeing. Be calm when talking to the 911 dispatchers; they have set questions they will need to ask such as: What are you reporting? Where are you? Suspect informationapproximate age, height, clothing; as well as any vehicle involved. Remember to be a witness, not a victim. Safety should be your #1 priority.

And Lastly ...

Not to be outdone by criminals, Introducing the latest threat to our community

By the way, This is the only cute rat ever ... Templeton ... a character in the story Charlotte's Web ... And the only reason he is cute is because he is fictional!!

A group of rats is called a Mischief! Rats are mainly nocturnal and live in burrows under ground or in your crawl spaces. If they decide that your crawl space is near their food supply, that's where they will set up their home. The damage they can do to your home can run into the tens of thousands of dollars in repair bills.

The Vineyard HOA is suggesting to people that since our weather has been mild, there really is no need to feed birdseed to our wild birds nor should our homeowners ever be putting raw compost into their gardens. This is what has attracted these freeloading "Templetons" to our community in the first place.

And apparently, one of our affected homeowners doesn't even feed bird seed or put out compost. But their neighbors do! Many situations attract rats:

- A hole or a crack in your home's foundation.
 They will find it
- Bird seed

For bird watchers, a great alternative is planting bird friendly plants and bushes, especially those that have seeds all winter like layender.

- Outside dog food bowls
 Bring them inside, we don't want rats, raccoons, or coyotes near our back doors.
- Garbage (including buried garbage)

This is not the first time our community has experienced a rat infestation. Years ago, it was found that a neighbor had been burying garbage in their backyard. Another fact was that their neighbors were aware of the situation and did not take action. All of us need to be part of the solution.

If you want to compost you garbage, that's fine, but please put it out in the green trash cans every week for our trash company, Waste Management, to haul away. A composting bin in your yard

should only be used for decomposing mowed grass, leaves, and similar yard waste.

Also, if you really want to grow a vegetable garden, PLEASE HARVEST ALL OF IT!

Meanwhile, if you suspect that you have a rat infestation, contact a pest control company immediately. They will be able to handle the situation safely. And the sooner the problem gets taken care of, the less costly it will be in the long run. Let your neighbors know that you are experiencing this problem so that they can check their homes as well.

It is unlikely rodent damage is covered by your homeowner's insurance, but you never know. It's

certainly worth rereading your policy to find out.
